What a marvellous five days we had over the Easter weekend this year. We started with a lovely wedding on Maundy Thursday. On Good Friday during our "Hour before the Cross" we considered the great gift of life which God has given to each and every one of us. A gift which should be treasured and enjoyed, and never taken for granted; it's a gift so precious that Jesus the son of God died on a cross to underline the fact.

Easter Saturday was a day of preparation for the remembrance of Easter Day when we celebrated the resurrection of Jesus from the dead. The resurrection miracle runs completely counter to human experience – where there was death there is now life. Jesus knew his disciples after the resurrection and just as importantly, they knew him and were reassured that all was well with him, and that all would go well with them also.

In the church and churchyard on Easter day, we had an Easter egg hunt for the children. It was a lovely sunny morning, and they had a great time with plenty of crème eggs to go round for everyone. There was cake and cup cakes in the church with fresh coffee, lattes, cappuccinos, tea, orange juice etc... It truly was a lovely Easter Sunday morning.

Sadly our celebrations were touched with a heavy, heavy sadness, as we remembered the tragic events our Christian brothers and sisters in Sri Lanka were enduring on Easter Sunday. We kept them in our prayers, and continue to do so, as they come to terms with the devastation that has blighted their churches and communities. In the midst of celebration tragedy is never far away. The terrible thing is that the human tragedy on Easter Sunday was no accident, but was deliberately inflicted to make a point, just as the crucifixion of Jesus was deliberately inflicted upon him to make a point.

There are times in our lives when things happen, not by accident but deliberately instigated by others, which makes us question what on earth is going on in the world, no matter how strong our faith. It's on such occasions that the message of the resurrection becomes so important to us, and I'm reminded of a sermon preached by one of our former bishops in which he said, "Remember, you can't keep a good God down, He's there all the time looking to lift us up, all the time".

I hope and pray that the Easter message will be a blessing to everyone – good will triumph over evil and life will be celebrated.

Our St Matthew's banner was carried along with those of other churches in the deanery and we enjoyed meeting many other members and catching up with news over cups of tea and biscuits.

On Friday 1 March the service for the Women's Ecumenical World Day of Prayer was held at Houghton Methodist church. It was a most enjoyable service which had been prepared by members of the Mothers' Union living in Slovenia. A member from St Matthew's together with five others from churches in our Houghton area took part in the telling of the lives of six women living in Slovenia during a period of difficulty and now at a more settled state. Many hymns were sung and the congregation did very well to sing a not very easy song. Cakes and biscuits with hot drinks were served after the service and we all left the church with a carnation, the national flower of Slovenia.



Ingredients

For the pastry

6 oz (175 g) plain flour

3 oz (75 g) butter, at room temperature,

1½ oz (40 g) Parmesan (Parmigiano Reggiano), finely grated

½ level teaspoon mustard powder cayenne pepper

1 large egg, beaten

For the filling

2 large Spanish onions, peeled and finely chopped

2 x 4 oz (110 g) Welsh goats' cheese logs

Thyme

1 oz (25 g) butter

1 large egg

4 fl oz (120 ml) single cream

1/4 level teaspoon mustard powder

cavenne pepper

salt and freshly milled black pepper


Caramelised Onion Tartlets with Goat's Cheese and Thyme

Method

- Pastry. Sift the flour, & add the butter.
 Then add the Parmesan, mustard and
 a pinch of cayenne pepper, plus about
 1½ tablespoons cold water to make a
 smooth dough. Then place in the fridge
 to rest for 30 minutes.
- Pre-heat the oven to gas mark 4, 180°C. After that, roll it out as thinly as possible, stamp out 24 rounds and line the tins with them. (The pastry will stand proud of the rim of the cups to allow for shrinkage.) Then prick the bases and brush with the beaten egg. Now bake on the middle and top shelves of the oven (swapping them over halfway through) for about 10 minutes, or until the pastry is just cooked through, then cool them on a wire rack.
- For the filling, melt the butter in a frying pan and cook the onions very gently, uncovered and stirring often, for about 30 minutes, or until they have turned a lovely golden brown caramel colour. Then leave to cool.
- Now whisk the egg with the cream and mustard and add some seasoning. Next, spoon a little of the onion mixture into each pastry case, spread it out evenly and pour the egg mixture over.
- Cut each cheese log into 12 thin slices, wiping the knife between slices;
- Place a slice on the top of each tartlet, then top with a sprinkling of thyme and a sprinkling of cayenne pepper.
- Bake for 20 minutes, or until puffy and golden, swapping the tins again halfway through cooking.

Margaret Ann Mason 1935 -2019

It was with great sadness that we heard the news of Margaret's death. She an important well loved member of our congregation. Margaret was born in Sunderland. but when she was still the family young very moved to High Wycombe, Buckinghamshire, so that her father could find work. The family settled very happily there and Margaret



Margaret's aim when she was young was to be a cleaner, but she trained as an upholsterer in the furniture industry, which was centred in High Wycombe. Margaret met Roy and after his national service, they married when Margaret was 21. They were very happy together, until tragically Roy lost his life after a fall from scaffolding at the gable end of a house.

Margaret met second husband Bill Mason when she came to visit her sister Doreen, who lived in Houghton. They got married at Chester-le-Street registry office, followed by a blessing in St Matthew's church, by Michael Bates. After marrying Bill, Margaret moved from High Wycombe into a newly built bungalow, "Rosewillow", in Coaley Lane. By 1977 Margaret had moved into her current house at 14, Maidstone Terrace, Philadelphia. She was blessed with two loving daughters, Angie and Dawn, who she used to take to High Wycombe to visit her family. Angie and Dawn have great memories of these holidays with their mam.

It was after Bill died at home 20 years or so ago, that Margaret became more actively involved in the life of this church. She voluntarily took on the job of cleaner and would spend most Tuesdays up in church, and often a large part of Saturday. Everything had to be perfect. She was the verger and so was present at all christenings, weddings



and funerals, and Sunday and mid-week services. Margaret was an active member of the Mothers' Union and helped to run the GFS. She also helped to run the Thursday lunch club for many years and eventually joined everyone for lunch. Margaret was a member of the PCC and the church hall management committee. She was at the heart of church life until her declining

health and the passing of time slowed her down and we are very thankful for all she did. Everything that Margaret did in her church life was done quietly and thoughtfully as an expression of her faith.

At Margaret's funeral, Eddy read out eulogies that both Dawn and Angie had written for their mam. They said how very gentle, dutiful, unassuming and generous Margaret was, giving them everything she could afford. Margaret was always there for them, encouraging and praising, so proud of her daughters. Angie felt that Margaret was "mum". That's what Margaret liked to be called, and how she always signed herself. It was the Southerner in her and she refused to pick up any North East accent! To Dawn she was "mam" – Margaret Ann Mason.

When Dawn got married Margaret gave her away and happily accepted Bart into the family, as she did with Paul, Angie's husband. She was there in court in 2012 when Dawn and Bart adopted Leah and was very giving to all their fostered children, a true foster grandparent. Angie said what a lovely grandma she had been to Rhys and she loved nothing better than playing with dinosaurs or jigsaws on the floor with him.

Both Angie and Dawn said they missed being able to phone her, and tell her news or funny stories of the children.

Margaret will be greatly missed by all. It was a privilege to know her.

This led the Church to mark every Friday as a 'Good Friday', where people remember the Passion by offering the 'penance'.

Meat was seen as a worthy sacrifice as it was linked with feasts and celebrations.

In ancient cultures meat was seen as a delicacy and "the fattened calf" wasn't slaughtered unless there was something to celebrate.

Fridays were seen as a day of penance so eating meat on a Friday to "celebrate" the death of Jesus didn't sit well with the Church.
