At the start of a new year, let alone the start of a new decade, which we do this January, it is a good time to reflect on what's gone before us. learn from past mistakes and successes, and plan for the future to the best of our ability in a positive way. The amazing thing is that no matter how carefully we look to learn from past events. what things went badly or went really well, there is a tendency for us to make and often repeat past mistakes, or even find new ones. In the life of the church, if we look at what we might consider a success in the past and then try to do the same at a future time, often we learn that something that worked in the past no longer works for us, it's time has passed.

We constantly need to be learning from the lessons of the past and planning for the future,with an open mind and a willingness to go where the spirit of God is leading us. We need to be brave and adventurous in our journey of faith, which I have to admit doesn't necessarily come easily to the Church or Church members. Safety first seems to be the default path we follow, and risk avoidance comes all too easily because it is reassuring – "Don't take any chances and there's less possibility of making a mistake" but there's also a smaller chance of making genuine progress.

In the Church's calendar, we're now in the season of Christmas and Epiphany, which is when we remember that God in the birth Jesus, came to reveal himself to us. God took a risk in being born as we all were, so that we might know what it's like to be like him and he like us. No matter how carefully we plan things, whenever we plan

anything, there is always an element of risk involved. God understands that because he has lived the human experience that we all live. There is tremendous sadness in life and there is tremendous joy in life, and these times punctuate our existence. When I sit with a family and reflect over a loved one's life prior to a funeral, it's the highs and lows that are remembered; the everyday things drift into obscurity.

Often someone has said to me something like "Mv mam was a tremendous knitter she made Christmas jumpers for all the family especially the kids" or "My mam made the best chocolate cake ever"; or perhaps "My dad could fix anything" or "My dad was always there when we needed him". The point is that those we cherish and love, our parents for instance, put real time, effort and energy into doing their best for us. When we stretched our wings and mistakes occurred, they were there to pick us up, dust us down and do their best for us, to make sure we got ourselves on our feet again. Sometimes the dusting down could be painful and upsetting for all concerned -as has been said on many occasions: "Tough love is often the hardest but the best kind of love to give".

May the light of Christ and the love of the Father guide us along the journey of this life. May we as a community cherish and value everyone we come across, as each and every one of us is cherished and loved by God. Some might think it's a bit risky or too much of an ask, but we Christians are called to make the world a kinder, more loving place and we should at least try.

#### **Kim Harriman 1953-2019**



It was with the greatest of sadness that we heard the tragic news of Kim's sudden and unexpected death. It was within weeks of Kim's pending confirmation at church.

was born 24th February 1953. at Easington to Jack and Sarah. Kim was their second child. He has a much loved sister. Gloria. When he was 1 year old the family moved to St Aiden's Terrace at New Herrington. At school he met his lifelong friend Terry. Even as a boy Kim enjoyed gardening well as cycling. He was a patient, guiet lad, and after school he went to work at Walker's the iewellers. repairing watches and

clocks. Later he worked at a gent's outfitters and then for the Civil Service and finally, before retirement worked as a financial advisor with the Co-op.

Kim, and his wife, met at a disco in Silksworth Hall in March 1974 and married at St Matthew's on 18th September 1976. After waiting nearly 10 years for the birth of John, their family was blessed again 3 years later with the birth of Janette. Kim always said this gave them the perfect family, and his life was centred around his family.

In his early 50's, at Christmas 2004, Kim retired from the Co-op to enjoy his retirement. Sadly in November 2005 he was diagnosed with Leukaemia and went

through all the usual treatments over a 2 year period or so, but it was only after "Stem Cell" treatment and receiving a new immune system, that Kim fully recovered.

In 2008 Kim and Jacqui bought a touring caravan which they greatly enjoyed using for holidays. In 2010 Kim had his first foreign holiday in France, travelling across the channel on the ferry with all the family including the grandchildren.

Kim attended our church

functions such as quiz evenings, fairs and BBQ's etc... but most folk will remember him taking his dog Toby for a walk around the village and the churchyard, stopping to talk to people as he went.

Jacqui and the family are shocked and devastated at Kim's sudden and totally unexpected passing. To them he was a "Larger than Life" character who was at the centre of their lives and who fought as hard as he could against his illness to remain with them. He is greatly loved and treasured and will never be forgotten.

## Christing le at St. Matthew's

The service was on Christmas Eve. Eddy, the vicar lead the service and Malcolm gave the talk and showed a short Nativity animation film. During the service everyone was given a Christingle - an orange with a red ribbon, dried fruits, sweets and a candle. The orange represents the world, the red ribbon indicates God's love wrapped around the world and the blood Jesus shed on the cross. The dried fruits and sweets represent God's creation, though some take them to mean the four seasons. Finally the lit candle symbolises Jesus, the light of the world.

This custom began in the Moravian Church in Germany. At a children's service in Marienborn, in 1747, Bishop Johannes de Watteville decided to give the children

a symbol to celebrate the birth of Jesus. Much later, in 1968, John Pensom of The Children's Society adopted the Christingle and introduced it to the Church of England.

The Christingle service attracted a number of people who we haven't seen before. It was good to welcome them. Many thanks to Will Render who donated the oranges and all those who made the Christingles.

This year, at Newbottle St Matthew's we raised £254 for The Children's society. This goes to support vulnerable children and young people, such as those in this country living in poverty and those with mental health problems.

#### Church Records

At St. Matthew's we hold a burials register listing burials in the churchyard dating from November 1945 to the present time. All previous registers are held in a controlled environment in the "County Records Office" at Durham County Hall.

There are over 5,000 people buried in St. Matthew's churchyard. Where there are headstones it is possible to identify where people are buried. However, many graves do not have headstones or any other form of grave marker.
